Networking Event

The InRuTou Networking Event took place at the Vienna International Centre, Vienna, Austria on July 15, 2015.

The objective of the event was to develop follow-up of the project in the pilot communities and by involving other partners and countries of the Carpathians and in other mountain areas. Both project ideas and potential funding sources were discussed.

Some of the ideas for follow-up projects included:

- involvement of protected areas in tourism development
- intergenerational practice
- youth entrepreneurship
- creative industries grounded in cultural heritage.

The event was open to interested participants and gathered app. 40 representatives of organizations and individuals engaged in the sustainable development, tourism development and youth entrepreneurship projects.

The networking event followed InRuTou Partners Meeting and Third Meeting of the Trainers dedicated to the evaluation of activities undertaken in the pilot areas in Italy, Poland, Romania and Ukraine. Partners and trainers also had the opportunity to experience Austrian rural tourism during a study trip.

Final Conference

The InRuTou Final Conference was organized in Hotel Bachledówka, near Nowy Targ, Poland on October 16, 2015.

The event brought together partners of two projects: 'InRuTou – Innovation in Rural Tourism' and 'Carpathian University of Participation' as well as experts and practitioners in the area of rural tourism development. The conference focused on two aspects of Rural Tourism in Mountain Areas – Innovation & Civic Participation and presented an opportunity to discuss further the development of follow-up activities in the projects pilot communities and by involving other partners and countries of the Carpathians and in other mountain areas.

The event was opened to all interested participants and gathered about 100 representatives of organizations and individuals active in the fields of sustainable development, tourism development and engaging communities.

The Final Conference was accompanied by InRuTou Partners Meeting and Study Visit to Polish Piloting Area – an opportunity to experience rural tourism in the Carpathians.





InRuTou Publications

The InRuTou Transferability
Manual is a methodological
publication that explains how
the project was developed
based on its implementation
process as well as background
and technical documents.

It strives to support interested organizations in transferring the InRuTou methods to other communities, regions, and countries.

The manual was presented during the InRuTou Networking Event held in Austria in July 2015.





The InRuTou **Final** Publication 'Cases from European Mountain Communities' compliments the Transferability Manual and introduces the beneficiary communities - pilot sites of the project in Austria, Italy, Poland, Romania and Ukraine and presents the process of the testing and results in each participating area.

The aim of this final project publications to provide inspiration and concrete examples of implementing the InRuTou training.

Both publications should be used together by organizations interested in transferring the InRuTou methods to other communities, regions, and countries.

InRuTou Pilot Trainings

The InRuTou project was developed to facilitate sustainable tourism in mountainous rural areas, by creating and testing a set of tools and innovative models and by training existing and new local tourism operators, which have various degrees of experience as well as a different professional and educational backgrounds.

The project brought together attendees from six pilot areas located in five countries and across three different mountain ranges:

1) The Alps

Austria: National Park Kalkalpen Region Ennstal & Steyertal

2) The Apennines

Italy: Parco dell'Aveto

3) The Carpathians

Poland: Beskidy Mountains

Romania: Tara Dornelor

Ukraine: Kosiv District, Starozhynetstky

District.

Piloting communities aimed at development of innovative tourism projects using InRuTou tools – e-Learning and Sharing Platforms, a desktop and mobile application, and with the assistance of previously trained local opinion leaders.

Local Tourism Products

Pilot areas located in Italy, Poland, Romania and Ukraine developed about twenty new tourism products varying from hiking & biking trips to the itinerary of local cultural & tourism events to local brands.

The combination of different experiences and ideas of local communities scattered around rural Europe enhanced their perspective and influenced the final output. Bringing together various stakeholders in each of the areas and uniting them around a common goal proved to be the important additional value of pilot training and a vital success factor.

InRuTou (m)app

The app allows tourists to search for touristic Points of Interests (PoI) in pilot areas that participated in the project. The aim of the tool is to connect tourists with local entrepreneurs and to promote sustainable tourism in rural areas in Europe. In particular the app was used to:

- promote the rural destination involved in the project
- catalogue all the rural attractions of the pilot areas of the project.

The InRuTou app is multilingual and the content, if available, can be searched in English, Romanian, Polish, Italian and Ukrainian.

The app can be downloaded from Google and Apple stores; there is also the browser version accessible under the address: inrutou.eu/app.
